ABOUT THE RESERVE

Farrar Nature Reserve supports a variation of flora and fauna due to the diversity of soils and profile. The Reserve consists of Sheoak Groves, Open Woodland, Low Scrub, Granite Outcrops and Winter Wet areas.

The Railway Dam is a man made structure sunk by horse and cart and the hard labour of the early settlers in the early 1900's. The purpose of the dam was to supply fresh water for steam engines, which was pumped from the Dam to the Railway Siding. Prior to 1982 the train ran from Boyup Brook through the Reserve, to Kojonup.

Before the town swimming pool was built in 1970, the dam was used for swimming and recreational purposes.

Now long neck tortoises and numerous species of frogs may be found.

The Reserve is also home to many kangaroos and wallabies. Small marsupials have been seen including the red-tailed phascogale.

Numerous reptiles including the racehorse goanna, bobtail lizard and the occasional snake inhabit the Reserve.
